## REPORT EMERALD ASH BORER

 **EXOTIC INSECT ATTACKING ASH TREES**

All ash (*Fraxinus*) species are attacked, including white, green, black and blue.

The Emerald Ash Borer (*Agrilus planipennis*), native to Asia, was found attacking and killing ash trees in Michigan in 2002. Millions of trees are now dead or dying in southeast Michigan.

The Emerald Ash Borer has NOT been found Wisconsin (2006).

Many new infestations of EAB in the Great Lakes area are caused by people moving infested firewood. Please purchase your firewood near where you plan to use it. Use it all, or leave it behind. 
Adult Emerald Ash Borer is  $\frac{3}{8}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$  long.


# HELP US LOOK FOR THIS BEETLE!

HAVE YOU SEEN 2 OR MORE  
OF THESE SYMPTOMS & SIGNS?

- Bullet-shaped metallic green adult beetles present from June to August. (A)
- S-shaped tunnels under the bark created by larvae feeding. (B)
- Cream-colored, flattened (full grown) larvae boring under the bark. (C)
- D-shaped holes in the bark where adult beetles have emerged. (D)
- Dieback of the upper and outer tree top (E)
