OSHA Hispanic Outreach

OSHA has made immigrant workplace safety a priority within the agency and is committed to identifying ways to improve the safety and health of immigrant and other hard-to-reach workers. While overall workplace fatalities have dropped 20 percent in the last decade, workplace fatalities among Hispanic workers, especially those working in the construction industry, have risen almost 35 percent in the same period. OSHA is taking a multi-pronged approach to improving safety and health for, and providing outreach and assistance to, Hispanic community.

Developing Hispanic-Serving Institutions Program – Title V
